Wiki

A wiki is a web application which allows people to add, modify, or delete content in collaboration with others.

In a typical wiki, text is written using a simplified markup language (known as "wiki markup") or a rich-text editor.

While a wiki is a type of content management system, it differs from a blog or most other such systems in that the content is created **without any defined owner or leader**, and wikis have **little implicit structure**, allowing structure to emerge according to the needs of the users.

Quick overview of wiki markup

- "'three apostrophes'" will make text **bold**
- "'two apostrophes'" will make text *italic*
- [[Text in double square brackets]] will be links to the page named as the text in the brackets
- [[Link target|link text]] will display a link that looks like link text but links to link target
- The wiki is case sensitive – but not on the first letter of a link
- The wiki is Unicode

Basic mediawiki markup

What it looks like

You can *italicize text* by putting 2 apostrophes on each side.

3 apostrophes will embolden **the text**.

5 apostrophes will embolden and italicize ***the text***.

(4 apostrophes don't do anything special -- there's just '**one left over**'.)

You should "sign" your comments on talk pages:

- Three tildes give your user name: [Example](#) ([talk](#))
- Four tildes give your user name plus date/time: [Example](#) ([talk](#)) 07:46, 27 November 2005 (UTC)
- Five tildes give the date/time alone: 07:46, 27 November 2005 (UTC)

What you type

You can `'italicize text'` by putting 2 apostrophes on each side.

3 apostrophes will embolden `'the text'`.

5 apostrophes will embolden and italicize `'the text'`.

(4 apostrophes don't do anything special -- there's just `'one left over'`.)

You should "sign" your comments on talk pages:

- * Three tildes give your user name: `~~~`
- * Four tildes give your user name plus date/time: `~~~~`
- * Five tildes give the date/time alone: `~~~~~`

Headings organize your writing into sections. The Wiki software can automatically generate a [table of contents](#) from them.

Subsection

Lists

Lists and indents

What it looks like

- *Unordered* [lists](#) are easy to do:
 - Start every line with a star.
 - More stars indicate a deeper level.
- Previous item continues.
 - A new line
- in a list

marks the end of the list.

- Of course you can start again.

1. *Numbered lists* are:

1. Very organized
 2. Easy to follow
2. Previous item continues

A new line marks the end of the list.

1. New numbering starts with 1.

What you type

Indents

A colon (:) indents a line or paragraph.

A newline starts a new paragraph. Often used for discussion on [talk pages](#). : A colon (:) indents a line or paragraph.

We use 1 colon to indent once.

A newline starts a new paragraph.
 Often used for discussion on talk pages.

: We use 1 colon to indent once.

:: We use 2 colons to indent twice.

We use 2 colons to indent twice.

::: 3 colons to indent 3 times, and so on.

3 colons to indent 3 times, and so on.

Here's a link to the [Main page](#).

But be careful - capitalization counts!

[Intentionally permanent red link](#) is a page that doesn't exist yet. You could create it by clicking on the link.

You can link to a page section by placing a "#" before its title:

- [Help:Contents#For editors](#).

If multiple sections have the same title, add a number. [#Example section 3](#) goes to the third section named "Example section".


